

Selection of the program, in the 2012-20

The EndDD.org presentation, in its present state, is unique in that it is scientifically guided, evidence-based, has webinar-based training components, i.e. "train the trainer", and includes an evaluation process an be replicated successfully on a larger scale in a variety of settings, school auditoriums or classrooms. The program demonstrated that the presentations can be given with minimal effort by and cost to schools distracted driving. This may have been one of reasons underlying the high demand for the program.

The program was developed integrating health communication, behavioral science and behavior change theory, and teen-targeted persuasion principles specifically designed to avoid unanticipated boomerang effect. There is no other program on this topic just like it currently available. The program is of high production quality, created to be interactive focusing on teen participation and involvement, and the informal feedback from presenters, school personnel, and teens indicates that it is meeting this goal.

We are impressed by the number of trial lawyers who delivered presentations to

teens and the number of teens across the country reached during the pilot program—more than 41,000. What an accomplishment in general, but particularly for its first year!


